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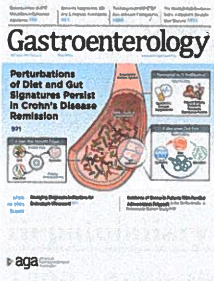
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This study suggests guidelines on when to test for and how to manage APC mosaicism, a genetic variant found in some body cells, in patients with unexplained adenomatous polyposis.
